The arrival of Spring makes it easier to take care of the outside of your home. Please be mindful if management observes or if a violation is reported by another community residents, a staff member will be assigned to explore the possible violation and if needed take photos for documentation.

An employee of Skyline may enter the outside of your property to inspect and photograph a violation (s). It is not our desire to invade your privacy, but rather to maintain the rules all residents signed and agreed to follow. For clarification of entry onto your space refer to the rule regarding the exterior of your home by a Skyline employee, page 20 Section 12 of the Rules & Regulations.

Currently some residents have or will be receiving notices to clear their carports, driveways and patios of items that are not allowed to be stored on the outside of the home. As well, you cannot place indoor furniture on the outside of your home. Only furniture specifically designated as "outdoor furnishings."

By law we conduct a yearly distribution of the HOPA Survey (The Housing for Older Persons Act), an age verification form which **has a large impact and benefit to our 55+ community.** It serves as an authorized declaration the community meets the compliance at least 80% of the homes in Skyline are occupied by at least one resident aged 55 or older.

These are confidentially kept on file if management should ever need proof of age status within the community. **Without these forms we could lose status as a senior community.**

CAN YOU FREEZE EGGS?

WHITES

Break and separate the eggs, one at a time, making sure that no yolk gets in the whites. Pour the whites into freezer containers, seal tightly, label with the number of egg whites and the date, and freeze. For faster thawing and easier measuring, first freeze each white in a standard ice cube tray. Then transfer to a freezer container.

YOLKS

The gelation property of egg yolk causes it to thicken or gel when frozen, so you need to give yolks special treatment. If you freeze them as they are, egg yolks will eventually become so gelatinous that they will be almost impossible to use in a recipe. To help retard this gelation, beat in either 1/8 teaspoon salt or 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar or corn syrup per 1/4 cup of egg yolks (about 4 yolks). Label the container with the number of yolks, the date, and whether you've added salt (for main dishes) or sweetener (for baking or desserts). Freeze.

WHOLE EGGS

Beat just until blended, pour into freezer containers, seal tightly, label with the number of eggs and the date, and freeze.

HARD-BOILED EGGS

You can freeze hard-boiled egg yolks to use later for toppings or garnishes. Carefully place the yolks in a single layer in a saucepan and add enough water to come at least 1 inch above the yolks. Cover and quickly bring just to boiling. Remove the pan from the heat and let the yolks stand, covered, in the hot water about 12 minutes. Remove the yolks with a slotted spoon, drain them well and package them for freezing. It's best not to freeze hard-boiled whole eggs and hard-boiled whites because they become tough and watery when frozen.

HOW TO USE FROZEN EGGS

According to the USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS), you can freeze eggs for up to one year. When you're ready to use frozen eggs, thaw them overnight in the refrigerator or under running cold water. Use egg yolks or whole eggs as soon as they're thawed. Thawed egg whites will beat to better volume if you allow them to sit at room temperature for about 30 minutes. Use thawed frozen eggs only in dishes that are thoroughly cooked.

Coyote Sightings

Coyotes have learned to survive, and often thrive, in urban and residential areas, and they are spotted in most neighborhoods in San Diego County.

Make sure food sources are removed from outside your home. This includes fallen fruit from trees, pet food and water, and unsecured trash cans in the backyard. Domestic pets are not safe outside, even in a fenced yard.



You may find using noisemakers, like whistles, banging pots and pans or making other loud noises might be effective in an attempt to scare them away.

The county will not respond to reports of wildlife being loose or simply roaming. They will respond when a wild animal is an immediate threat to people or other animals. The county will respond when an animal is sick or injured, too young to survive on its own, or trapped. Additionally, the county will respond if the wild animal is a rabies agent and has attacked you or your pet.

According to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, coyotes are by nature are fearful of humans. Coyotes play an important role in the ecosystem and help keep rodent populations under control.
